Vermont Assistive Technology Program (VATP)

VATP works to increase awareness and knowledge, and to change policy and practice, to assure technology is available through all services to Vermonters with disabilities.

DAIL Shared Living Accessibility Modification Reimbursement Process

Provider Agencies may be reimbursed up to \$1,000.00 per Participant in a Shared Living Home for costs incurred for implementing home modifications within the 45-day timeline requirement.

- <u>Equity Funding Committee</u> The Equity Funding Committee assists in the management of new caseload funding when Designated Agencies and Specialized Service Agencies are applying for developmental services funding on behalf of a new or existing service participant. Equity funding must be requested according to the Vermont System of Care Plan (SOC) requirements.
- Public Safety Funding Public Safety funding priority is managed through the <u>Public Safety Funding Committee</u>. Public Safety funding must be requested according to the Vermont System of Care Plan (SOC) requirements.

Vermont Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired (VABVI)

The Vermont Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired (VABVI) is the only private agency to offer training, services, and support to visually impaired Vermonters. "Our mission is to enable Vermonters who are blind or visually impaired, to be more independent, cultivate adaptive skills and improve their quality of life."

Division for the Blind and Visually Impaired (DBVI)

A Division of the Department of Disabilities, Aging, and Independent Living (DAIL) that provides vocational rehabilitation and independent living services to eligible Vermonters who are blind and visually impaired.
